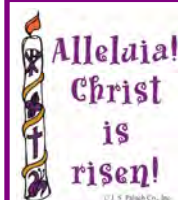

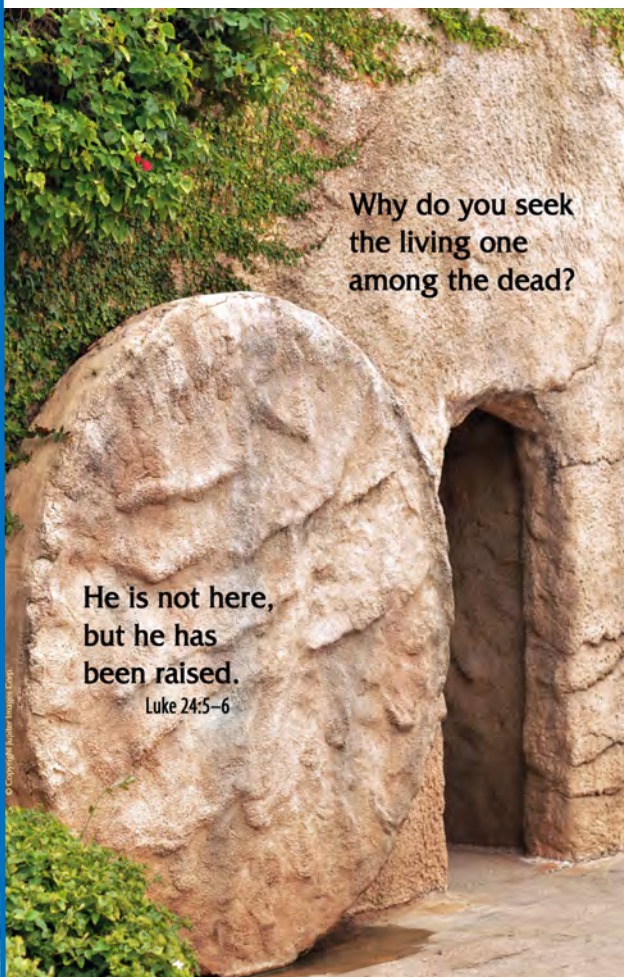

EASTER SUNDAY**DRAWN INTO THE STORY**

"We are witnesses!" The scripture readings for Easter Sunday concentrate on details reported by eyewitnesses. Listen carefully and you will be drawn into the stories yourself. Peter reports the good works Jesus did, his death on the cross, and his resurrection. The passage from John's Gospel has us running to the empty tomb with Peter and John and peering inside to see the cloths used to cover Jesus' body. Psalm 118 sums up our response: "It is wonderful in our eyes!"

What resurrection details do we see in our lives today? How have we died to our old lives and been raised up again with Jesus? Let us pay attention to the new life around us. It is wonderful in our eyes. Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.

Childish or Child-like?

The Gospel for Easter this year reminds me of little children. Mary of Magdalen runs from the tomb when she sees it has been opened. Then Peter and the other disciple race each other to the tomb. The other one wins the race but Peter goes in first (John 20:1-5). Besides running like excited kids, there is another way they are like children.

Remember the Gospel about St. Thomas, who would not believe Jesus' resurrection until he could see him? Compare that to the disciple in today's reading, who "saw [the empty tomb] and believed" (John 20:9). That is the kind of faith we find in a little child.

Children will believe in things they cannot see, especially if there is a good reason. We "bribe" them into believing in Santa Claus or the tooth fairy by giving them Christmas presents or money under the pillow. If we teach them that God made them and loves them, if we love them ourselves and teach them to love others, they will have good reasons to believe in a real and loving God. As they get older, we can teach them how to pray, save money for the poor, visit the sick, or volunteer to help the homeless.

Jesus didn't say that only children could enter the Kingdom. He said we must become like children if we want to enter the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 18:3). Becoming like children does not mean being selfish or stubborn, throwing tantrums when we don't get our way. Those are childish behaviors that we put aside. Instead, we can keep a child-like faith and trust in God. Teaching them about God is a great way to help our own faith to grow. By giving them real examples of God's love for them, they will continue to believe long after they have given up the fairy tales of childhood.

GOD'S MERCY ENDURES FOREVER

How comforting John's Easter Gospel. It proclaims not Jesus' presence but Jesus' absence, yet describes the presence of belief despite the absence of proof. What joy for serene believers! What comfort for anyone wrestling with doubt! What peace even for those simply wondering about it all! All of us renewing baptismal promises are reminded that the Jesus whom we seek is not dead in a tomb, but alive in all who need our love every day. Though we've not seen Jesus in person, as Peter did, we've seen Jesus in persons. Our life as disciples may be, as Paul says, "hidden with Christ in God," but sharing in this Eucharist places us among those who "ate and drank with Jesus after he rose from the dead." So Pope Francis' Jubilee of Mercy bids us become "the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth" for others, that is, living, nourishing witnesses of God's reconciling, unconditional love in Christ, "broken and shared," like the Eucharist, with others--all others. Parishioners asked WHY?

The Veiling of Images and Crosses - *Deacon Vincent Rinaldi*

1. Does the new Missale Romanum allow for the veiling of statues and crosses?
The Missale Romanum, editio typica tertia, provides a rubric at the beginning of the texts for the Fifth Sunday of Lent (originally the beginning of Passiontide), which allows that: “the practice of covering crosses and images in the Church from the Fifth Sunday of Lent is permitted, according to the judgment of the Conferences of Bishops. Crosses remain veiled until the end of the celebration of the Lord’s Passion on Good Friday; images remain veiled until the beginning of the Easter Vigil.”

2. Have the Bishops of the Unites States expressed the judgment on this practice?
Yes. On June 14, 2001, the Latin Church members of the USCCB approved an adaptation to number 318 of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal which would allow for the veiling of crosses and images in this manner.

3. When may crosses and images be veiled?
Crosses and images may be veiled on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Crosses are unveiled following the Good Friday Liturgy, while images are unveiled before the beginning of the Easter Vigil.

4. Is the veiling of crosses and statues required?
No. The veiling is offered as an option, at the discretion of the local pastor.

5. What is the reason for the veiling of crosses and images?
The veiling of crosses and images is a sort of “fasting” from sacred depictions which represent the paschal glory of our salvation. Just as the Lenten fast concludes with the Paschal feast, so too, our fasting from the cross culminates in an adoration of the holy wood on which the sacrifice of Calvary was offered for our sins. Likewise, a fasting from the glorious images of the mysteries of faith and the saints in glory culminates on the Easter night with a renewed appreciation of the glorious victory won by Christ, risen from the tomb to win for us eternal life.

6. What do the veils look like?
While liturgical law does not prescribe the form or color of such veils, they have traditionally been made of simple, lightweight cloth, without ornament. Purple signifies penance, red signifies martyrdom.

Given changing demographics, the increasing needs of the parishioners, the anticipation of fewer priests to serve the diocese, and the strain on facilities & finances, we are called to better stewards of our resources so that we can truly and in the best way possible meet the needs of active Catholics and share our faith with those who are marginalized or who have not yet heard the Good News.

The overall principle of ***Faith in Our Future*** initiative is that “parishes are more effective if they work together in ministry areas. It is envisioned that every parish community will collaborate with other parish communities where appropriate and feasible.” As we look to the future, new models for parishes are needed. The six models are: Collaborative Parish, Linked Parish, Merged Parish, In Solidum Team, Parish Life Director, Personal Parish

UPDATE:

Our parish hosted the FIOF Cohort meeting for Monmouth County on March 15 and 16. The Cohorts will continue to meet individually in the coming months to plan and consider models for recommendation. Cohorts make recommendations to Diocesan Planning Commission on **June 1, 2016**. Preliminary Recommendations from Diocesan Planning Commission to Cohorts & Parish will be received by **June 30, 2016**.

Who is the DIOCESAN PLANNING COMMISSION

- appointed by Bishop O’Connell and advisory to him
- 20 members who are respected clergy, religious, and lay leaders from diverse backgrounds and geographic areas within the Diocese.
- represented in the group are those with experience in Catholic schools, catechetical programs, liturgy, and human concerns

What is the FUNCTION of the PLANNING COMMISSION?

- insures transparency, and that all sides and points of view have been heard on the parish and cohort levels
- gives general advice and makes recommendations to the Bishop O’Connell on the planning process
- Reviews criteria for assessing parish vitality considering Mission, demographics, and stewardship
- Studies available data about parishes and diminishing number of priests
- Reviews suggestions and responses from the Cohort Core Teams
- Prepares Preliminary and Final Recommendations
